# Journey to Okinawa: Lesson Plan

**Subject:** Social Studies **Grade levels:** 9-12

**Length:** 1-2 (45 minute class periods)

**Description:** This lesson seeks to teach students about cross-cultural connections post-WWII between U.S. soldiers and Japanese civilians.

#### **Academic Standards:**

U.S. History Standards:

- 8.3.12.A. Identify and evaluate the political and cultural contributions of individuals and groups to United States history from 1890 to Present.
- 8.3.12.B. Identify and evaluate primary documents, material artifacts and historic sites important in United States history from 1890 to Present.
- 8.3.12.C. Evaluate how continuity and change has influenced United States history from 1890 to Present.
- 8.3.12.D. Identify and evaluate conflict and cooperation among social groups and organizations in the United States history from 1890 to present.

### World History Standards:

- 8.4.12.A. Evaluate the significance of individuals and groups who made major political and cultural contributions to world history since 1450.
- 8.4.12.B. Evaluate historical documents, material artifacts and historic sites important to world history since 1450.
- 8.4.12.C. Evaluate how continuity and change throughout history has impacted belief systems and religions, commerce and industry, innovations, settlement patterns, social organization, transportation and roles of women since 1450.
- 8.4.12.D. Evaluate how conflict and cooperation among social groups and organizations impacted world history from 1450 to Present in Africa, Asia, Americas and Europe.

### **Objectives:**

- The students will be able to define kimono
- The students will be able to explain key events of WWII in the Pacific.
- The students will be able to analyze cross cultural connections between Japan and the U.S. post-WWII.
- The students will create a kimono using the symbolism they learned from the online exhibit.

**Prerequisites:** Students should be familiar with WWII and the Pacific Theater of Operation.

# **Opener/Warm-up:**

- Students will conduct a type-one writing activity:
  - Ask students to bullet point anything they know about Japan or Japanese culture
    - This will allow students to begin thinking about Japan
    - Ask students to share out their answers

#### **Lesson Activities:**

- 1. Students will read through the online exhibit "Journey to Okinawa"
  - a. While reading through the exhibit, students will complete the "<u>Journey to Okinawa: Guided Questions</u>" to ensure students understand the material of the lesson
- 2. Students will be given the "Design Your Own Kimono" Activity
  - a. Students will utilize what they have learned regarding Japanese Kimono Symbolism to create their own Kimono
    - i. On the back of the worksheet, students will explain their symbolism choices
- 3. Optional Extension Activity: Students will be research different cross cultural contributions between Japan and America
  - a. Students can then create a Google Slides presentation to share with the class

# **Closing Activity:**

- Students will be asked to answer the question: In the years following the conclusion of the war, how did Japanese and Americans influence each other culturally?
  - This can be answered in the form of an exit ticket, jamboard, verbal response...etc.
